

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Introduction and Welcome by the Bishop of Rochester

Biography of Sandra McCalla

Sandra brings to the role of Archdeacon a wealth of legal expertise as a former barrister in the city of London for many years. She trained for Ministry at Westcott House and Lucy Cavendish College, Cambridge. Sandra has a wealth of parochial experience in the Diocese of London, serving her title in the parish of Poplar, as an incumbent in the parish of Heston, as well as being a Dean of Racial Justice and Chaplain and lecturer at St Mellitus theological college. As Chaplain to the Bishop of London, Sandra has had first-hand knowledge of the complexities of running a large and diverse Diocese. Sandra is delighted to be joining the Diocese of Rochester and looks forward to getting to know everyone.

Biography of Nicholas Cornell

Nick is married to Gillian and they have two sons both at secondary school. He grew up in the Diocese of Rochester and studied modern languages at Trinity Hall, Cambridge before qualifying as a tax advisor for a large accountancy firm in London.

After training for ministry at Oak Hill Theological College, he was ordained deacon in 2008 and served his curacy in the Chichester Diocese in a town-centre church in Eastbourne. He then undertook a first incumbency serving two rural parishes -Maresfield and Nutley for six years where he was also for a time Acting Archdeacon of Hastings.

In 2018 Nick moved to Rochester to become Rector at Christ Church, Southborough where he has also served as Area Dean of Tunbridge Wells and more recently as one of the Associate Archdeacons of Tonbridge. He is looking forward to serving the diocese in the role of Archdeacon particularly in growing healthy churches and supporting clergy and laity as they navigate the opportunities and challenges of contemporary ministry in this ever-changing time.

Nick loves reading, music, watching films and seeing friends and family. He also enjoys a strong cup of coffee and tinkering with an array of technology.

The Presentation

The Archdeacons–Designate are presented to the Bishop by Mrs Sarah Poole, Chair of the House of Laity and the Revd Canon Jeremy Blunden, Chair of the House of Clergy, saying

> Bishop Jonathan, we present to you The Reverend Prebendary Sandra McCalla to be collated and installed as Archdeacon of Rochester and The Reverend Nicholas Cornell to be collated and installed as Archdeacon of Tonbridge.

The Bishop replies

Sandra, you have been chosen to be the new Archdeacon of Rochester and Nicholas you have been chosen to be the new Archdeacon of Tonbridge. Do you believe God is calling you to this ministry?

The Archdeacons-Designate reply

I do so believe

The Declaration and Oaths

The Bishop reads the Declaration of Oaths and then says

Sandra and Nicholas before you are commissioned as Archdeacons, you must by law make the Declaration of Assent and take the Oath of Allegiance to His Majesty the King, the Oath of Canonical Obedience to the Bishop and the Oath to observe the Cathedral Statutes.

The Declaration of Assent

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, the Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making him known to those in your care?

Archdeacons-Designate holding a Bible in their right hand facing the Bishop say

I, Sandra Sheron McCalla, I, Nicholas Simon Cornell, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.

The Oath of Allegiance

Archdeacons-Designate facing west say

I, Sandra Sheron McCalla, I, Nicholas Simon Cornell, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King Charles the Third, his heirs and successors, according to the law: So help me God.

The Oath of Canonical Obedience

Archdeacons- Designate facing the Bishop say

I, Sandra Sheron McCalla, I, Nicholas Simon Cornell, do swear by Almighty God that I will pay true and canonical obedience to the Bishop of Rochester and his successors, in all things lawful and honest: So help me God.

The Oath of Observing the Cathedral Statutes

Archdeacons-Designate say

I, Sandra Sheron McCalla, I, Nicholas Simon Cornell, do swear by Almighty God that I will faithfully observe the Statutes, Ordinances and laudable customs of the Cathedral Church of Christ and The Blessed Virgin Mary, Rochester, so far as they are not contrary or repugnant to the laws and God and the Statutes of this Realm and so far as they concern me in respect of my being collated to a Canonry in the said Cathedral Church: So help me God.

The Collation

The Archdeacons-Designate kneel, the Bishop reads the Deed of Collation and then hands it to the new Archdeacons saying

Sandra and Nicholas, receive this ministry, which you and I both share, In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen**

The Bishop prays for God's blessing on the Archdeacons

Sandra and Nicholas, God give you the spirit of holy discipline, faithfulness, and love for all. The Lord bless you and watch over you; The Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious to you. **Amen**

The Archdeacons are vested in their copes by the Dean and Residentiary Canons.

The Bishop says

This Cathedral Church of Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary is a place of daily prayer and worship at the heart of our Diocese. It is a place that all can call home and provides the opportunity for discovery, encounter and faith for everyone who comes here. As the seat of the Bishop, it is often the focus for our diocesan life together.

You are to be members of the College of Canons of this Cathedral. The College is a community of fellowship and mutual support which, as a focus for unity, enables the Bishop, Cathedral and Diocese to work together for the building up of the kingdom of God. As members of the College, you should seek to contribute to the corporate life of the Cathedral and to promote its mission and service to the Diocese and wider church.

The Installation

The Bishop hands the Mandate to the Dean saying

Dean Philip, receive this mandate empowering and requiring you to induct and install Sandra and Nicholas into the seats designated to the Archdeacon of Rochester and the Archdeacon of Tonbridge in this Cathedral Church.

The Dean, holding the Mandate in his hand, takes each new Archdeacon in turn by the right hand and installs them saying

By virtue of this Mandate, I do induct and install you, Sandra as Archdeacon of Rochester into the real and actual possession of the assigned canonry and stall in the Quire of this Church, with all the rights and duties of the said canonry.

By virtue of this Mandate, I do induct and install you, Nicholas as Archdeacon of Tonbridge into the real and actual possession of the assigned canonry and stall in the Quire of this Church, with all the rights and duties of the said canonry.

We welcome you into our fellowship with a glad heart. The Lord preserve your coming in and your going out from this time forth and for evermore.


