CARPETS IN CHURCHES

There is an increasing vogue for carpets to be used as a floor covering in churches. Setting aside, for the moment, the principle of whether or not carpet in churches is appropriate, PCCs should be aware of the following points:-

- 1. <u>NO</u> carpet should be introduced without due authority, either from the Archdeacon or through faculty.
- 2. The effect on historic fabric must be investigated.
- 3. Carpet can damage brasses, stone slabs and mediaeval tiles. They will need specialist protection.
- 4. Floors without damp proof courses (DPCs) will be damp.
- 5. Unless the floor is known to have a DPC, or is a raised wooden platform, the choice of carpet or underlay must not be manufactured from rubber, gel or other non-porous materials. Damp will accumulate under the covering and could be forced out towards the walls.
- 6. Any fixings must not damage historic fabric or adversely affect the appearance of a floor if the carpet is removed.
