All Saints church is located within the civil parish of Speldhurst on the A264 approximately two miles west

of Royal Tunbridge Wells town centre in an area of natural outstanding beauty. There are 1300 households within the parish. Access to London and the coast takes approximately 55 minutes and the M25 motorway network is within 20 minutes of Langton.

There is the Langton Green Village Hall on the recreation ground along with the Community Hub, this runs a café and is the sports pavilion, there are many activities run here including some of the Thrive sessions. 

Church Building

All Saints' church is a Grade II* Listed building designed by Sir George Gilbert Scott. With the nave, chancel and vestry completed in 1863 followed by various additions over the years all of which have produced a very interesting building that is being used well. A memorial garden is located along the western boundary of the church grounds. There is the Thrive Langton community garden to the north.

The condition of the church is generally good with only minor works carried out. Our last Quinquennial Inspection was during the summer of 2023 and there were no big issues identified.

Our hall is connected to the church via a small lobby along the northern elevation of the church

where a kitchen, office and WC are located within the extension. This addition to the church was completed in 2006.

Our beautiful church has much to offer, from stained glass windows, it's most well known one being Mary Magdalene.

Our lych gate welcomes you in from the road and leads you to the church or past the memorial garden and Thrive garden to the church hall at the back.

We have full disabled access into the church and hall.

The choir vestry on the south aisle is fully sound proof and has had a number of uses over the years including a creche.

The children's chapel (Vestry 1911) contains the Mary Magdalene window.







Church Hall—Gracespace

Our church is beautiful and welcoming with the added use of our church hall known as Gracespace. It is used in many different ways by us as a church and by the wider community. We also have a secure church office as part of our new build along with a kitchen and toilet.

Is a calm and peaceful space set up for our Godly Play worship with our children.





What we do - our ministry

As an Anglican Church we believe that our ministry should include helping people feel a sense of God and experiencing come closer to God. This can happen when we do things in the community and we try to draw people into the church family when we gather together in church for acts of common worship. This is where we start our mission. There is something truly wonderful when seeing our church, filled with the Holy Spirit during services, as at our recent Easter Day service. We would like to look at ways of trying to bring people together in church to experience the comfort that can bring. It will be a big task to find the kind of worship that can appeal across a wide section of our community. Some will like traditional, some modern and reflective, some family orientated. There is room for many styles so we can continue to grow.

Church groups include: Children's Chapel, Little Saints (a mother and toddler group), Mothers' Union, We would very much like to revive the Choir and Music group as we see it as an important part of our worship.

How we worship

The principle gathering is for worship at the Parish Communion at 10.30am on Sunday. Although our 8am service is equally well attended most weeks. This is a traditional service using modern language, eucharistic vestments are worn and the service spoken setting of the Mass. Music plays an important aspect of the worship at All Saints. An informal All Age Worship is held usually on the 2nd Sunday of the month. Other regular services include Holy Communion (Common Worship using more modern language) at 8am each Sunday. Twice a month we hold Chocolate Church - family orientated Godly Play worship with a chocolatey breakfast.

During covid we had the opportunity to reach out to people in a different way offering services on Zoom and via You Tube. While we do not have the same need now it is something we could explore further. Our 7.15am morning prayer service is held every morning during the week on zoom.





Prayer

We have Morning Prayer on Zoom each weekday which is a lovely way to start each day. Our church is open every day for people to spend time in quiet individual prayer and contemplation, this is very important to us as it allows everyone to share our space and find quite time with God. We have a prayer team who pray regularly for those on our prayer list, people known to us who need our support. We encourage our congregation to use the seasonal prayer themes such as Watch and Pray, Thy Kingdom Come.



Children and young families and Youth

The endeavour is to hold something every week for our young people and families, whether that is Chocolate Church, Children's Chapel or All Age Worship - we would very much like to develop the fun side of being part of our church and enable people to join in activities such as a youth club, sports, Lego services.









Older people and others in need

There are many older people who have made All Saints their faith home and we want to encourage them to be really involved not only in our services on a Sunday but in our Afternoon Teas or our Crochet and Chat afternoons.

Thrive Garden

Round the side of our churchyard we have a newly established area known as the Thrive Garden. This is a wonderful community project to encourage anyone interested to join in, to look after, grow and appreciate flowers, fruit and vegetables in a mindful and peaceful setting.










Homegroups

Little Saints

Once a week we hold a mother and toddler group to encourage support of young families. It is a chance for parents to chat and make friends and share a cuppa with like minded people.

Courses

Short courses are run, quite often via Zoom for special times of the year: a five week Lent course - 'Watch and Pray' and an in person course for Advent which used several different mediums including journalling, painting and meditation to enhance our spiritual direction before Christmas. We have run very successful confirmation courses for both adults and children and an 'Explore' course for those just dipping a toes in the water to find out more. We look forward to holding more.

Community

Our village community is very important to us. We try to work with other community projects such as Thrive Langton, a local charity supporting people's mental welfare. They use our church hall, known as Gracespace for coffee mornings and have started work on creating a village community garden in the church grounds. There are monthly lunches for the older folk in the village which we support too. We welcome our uniformed youth groups on a regular basis and encourage them to participate in services each year. We have used the making of our crocheted and knitted banners to reach out to other people within the village, creating friendship groups that branch further afield. The summer fete is a great opportunity to bring our church closer to the people in the village too. We have a Men's Walking Group that meet once a month for a bacon butty and a sociable walk. Our Christmas Carol services held on The Green or in The Hare pub are a lovely way to reach out to those around us.

















Website and communications

An e-newsletter is sent out to the congregation and friends by email each month with the diary of events, readings, contact details and matters of interest.

The Church has developed good links with the Village Community. A bi-monthly village magazine which is delivered to all households publishes articles details of services etc. and announcements from the church. The church has a website and news is updated monthly.

Our Facebook page is very well used for up and coming events and thoughts for the day

We have just held our APCM and when you look at all the things we as a church are achieving it makes me feel very hopeful. We have a huge number of people who reall chipping in and helping in some way and for Emma and I and the rest of the PCC If feels fantastic.

We have used your replies to our questionnaires to write our parish profile (a booklet of information to give to any prospective priests who might like to become our new viacr) and are now fine tuning this to work alongside the other churches who will be in our new multi parish benifice. Very definitley progress.

We have two special services this month. Ths first is on 19th May when Rev Anthony Hammill will take our 10.30am and will bless our new Pentecost banner. The second is the following Sunday, 26th, when Rev Michael Gentry will be coming to take our Sunday services, so lovely that he can come back to support us during our interrugnum. Emma and I have started our Leading Worship course which runs through May and June for six weeks. This means that if we have a week that we can not find a priest to take our normal Holy Communion we will be able to run a Service of the Word effectively. This is a Church of England, recognised service that many churches have as part of their service each month, very similar to our Holy Communion services but without the Communion part. If anyone would be interested in undertaking this training please let us know as it is for all lay people and an excellent stepping stone to helping with our worship. They are run several times a year locally.

All Saints manages well with limited resources. In the light of post-covid changes and rising inflation we have pared our running costs back but still maintain the Church and the services with voluntary help and the support of the Diocese. We carry modest reserves to cater for unexpected events but we do have to look to the wider community for support in the longer term.
